From the editor...

Recently my Aunty and Uncle were volunteer caretakers of the Lighthouse on Deal Island—a small island in the Bass Strait, off the coast of Tasmania. They stayed there for 3 months, growing their own food, looking after the vegetation and performing maintenance jobs to the Lighthouse building.

The Lighthouse is actually the tallest in Australia. However, because of the often stormy weather in that region, approximately 40% of the time, the lighthouse was shrouded by clouds, severely limiting its usefulness in navigation! As a result, the lighthouse was decommissioned in 1992 and the volunteer caretaker roles commenced.

August 7th is celebrated as Lighthouse day and serves as a great reminder that we are God's light in the world. At times we may feel as though we are shrouded in clouds (as the Deal Island Lighthouse often is), but God will never decommission us!

Inspired by Lighthouse Day, the theme for this month's @Glynde is *Being a Lighthouse in our Community*. In this edition we get an update from LCC upstairs, from our Prayer Ministry, Women's Fellowship, Magnolias and some wonderful pictures of Mainly Music.

I hope you enjoy reading through some of the articles.

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From Pastor Wayne...

*Hi! I'm back again after a week's holidays in the Adelaide Hills with Jenine during the second term break. We enjoyed relaxing together, eating out, and going to the various Wineries....Anyway, back now to working with you for the Lord. ☺

*The theme for this month of the @Glynde is: **"Being a Lighthouse in our community"**. It's a powerful theme for us as a church, and for us as individuals in our community. A Lighthouse sends rays of light into the darkness around it. And that's what God wants us as a church to do, and us as individuals to do.

*Remember what Jesus said of himself: **"I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will have the light of life and will never walk in darkness"** (John 8:12).

And remember what Jesus said to his disciples in his Sermon on the Mount: **You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead, they put it on a lampstand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way,**

let your light shine before people, so that they may see your good works and praise your Father in heaven (Matt. 5:14-16).

And recall what Paul wrote to the Christians in Philippi:

Do everything without complaining or arguing, so that you may be innocent and pure as God's perfect children, who live in a world of corrupt and sinful people. **You must shine among them like stars lighting up the sky, as you offer them the message of life** (Phil. 2:2:14-16a).

So the picture of us as a church being a Lighthouse to the community around us, and us being little lighthouses, is a good one, in that it takes up the images that Jesus uses of himself as "the light of life", and what Jesus asks us to be: people who shine for him into the community around us.

***On Sundays, this thought is firmly in our mind, as we hold worship and Children's Ministry. In fact, our Children's Ministry on Sunday mornings is called just this: "Lighthouse Kids"**. We want to shine the light of Jesus,

and to have our children grow in their faith in God as their dear Father, and in Jesus himself as their Saviour and Friend. Please have a word to Angeline Joimol at the front desk, if you can be a helper, or even a leader, of Children's Ministry. The children leave our second service after the Children's Message and Children's Song, and head upstairs for a program of songs, stories, and activities which together shine the light of Jesus.

***In worship too, at 9 a.m. and 10.30 a.m., the light of Jesus shines as we hear the Bible readings, have a Children's message and Children's song, hear the pastor lead a message on one of the readings, sing hymns and songs, go to meet Jesus at The Lord's Supper, and so on.** Of note is the fact that our worship is not just for God's people, *for those who have been changed by the light of Jesus, and who know God's love and forgiveness through Jesus*, but for everyone who comes into our church. You know, this was a radical thought for me back in the late 20th Century. When I trained at Luther Seminary, we were told that "worship is for God's people". But then the Church Growth movement emphasised that any worship gathering is an opportunity to shine the light of Jesus *on anyone who is at church on a given day: people who have come along to church for a baptism, or a confirmation, or a Church 4 Kids, or because they have decided to give 'church' another go.*

When you worship, keep an eye out for visitors and new people to our church. Look for ways to shine the light of Jesus into their lives, so that our church is indeed a Lighthouse to all who come into it.

***During the week, we have many opportunities to shine the light of Jesus into the lives of people. Think of all the activities that we have in the Community Hub that is our church buildings: Craft, Playgroup, Mainly**


Music, English classes, Parenting/ Marriage courses, Coffee and Chat, Blokes, and so on. During the week here at church, we each have many opportunities to shine the light of Jesus into the lives of others by our actions and our words, and even at times we have opportunities to offer "the message of life".

If you can help in any of these ministries, have a chat to Barb Matiske, our Cross Cultural Coordinator, or myself, or Angeline.

*That's what we do as a Lighthouse here at our church.... **But, perhaps more importantly God also wants us to be little Lighthouses for Jesus each day of our life, as we interact with the people around us.** Remember what we were emphasizing as part of our *Living Questionable Lives* series in May and June: that through blessing people *by listening to them, by giving a word of affirmation, or by an act of kindness, or by giving a gift, or by eating with others*, we can provoke questions from the people around us as to who we are, and why we are the way we are. As we love and care for the people around us, God will give us opportunities to shine the light of Jesus for Him. May God bless us as we are each little Lighthouses for Jesus ☺

*So not a bad theme for @Glynde in this month of August: namely "Being a Lighthouse in our community". Remember the greatest gift you can give to a family member or a friend or a contact is to shine the light of Jesus into their life.

Lighthouse Keeper or Light Housekeeper?

The theme of this edition of @Glynde is "How can we be a lighthouse?" As I mulled this over, a corny cartoon came to mind about a job advertisement for a lighthouse keeper attracting an applicant with a mop and bucket saying, "I thought you wanted a light house-keeper".

If we think of our church as a lighthouse, then I think we need both lighthouse keepers and light housekeepers! People who tend the light and keep the vision and mission of our church strong, and people who work behind the scenes to ensure the place is clean and that all the arrangements are in place for different activities and that led me to thinking of Jesus' words:

"Come to me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matthew 11:28)

Jesus cares for us – His light shines on us and he also cares for us and keeps us close. He "cleans" up our lives and is a beacon for people who are searching for God and for Truth in a world of confusing choices. He gifts us his gifts of gentleness and humility, peace and light.

It is this Jesus that shines through us in our worship and ministries here at Glynde. He is present in the people who keep our ministries and outreach alive and growing.

And so, in this edition, I would like to particularly acknowledge our lighthouse keepers and light housekeepers:

- Those who clean our church and facilities so that all who come here have a pleasant and welcoming experience
- Those who attend training and courses to ensure we provide a ChildSafe place for children and families and that our leaders are

aware of the policies and practices of the Lutheran Church of Australia to help us meet national church standards

- Those who attend church meetings and plan events and activities and support each other
- Those who volunteer time and expertise to maintain and improve our building.

Let us also acknowledge and celebrate those who serve here to provide a rich and varied range of worship services – Pastor Wayne, Pastor Henry and the people who contribute through music, serving communion, readings, prayers, sound desk and children's talks. Our outreach ministries provide weekly activities that attracted over 1500 attendances in a 13-week period from March through to June, and over 22 members volunteer time to support these ministries, many of which are coordinated by Barb Mattiske, our Cross Cultural Outreach Coordinator. If we include the Craft groups, bread run, cards and other social groups, the important place of our community in the wider community becomes even more significant.

All of these ministries add up to our church in action.

May God bless us all as we seek to be a lighthouse in all our ministries.

Lobethal Archives And Museum

The Magnolias group had a very informative guided tour on the 22nd June of the Archives, Museum, Cemetery and Church complex with Rose Kay, who was a member of the Glynde Church until 1994.

During the 1960s a modern museum was built around the original Lutheran Seminary, which was a half timbered rendered building dating from 1845. It is the oldest Theological college in Australia and the oldest still in existence in the Southern Hemisphere. The students spent most of their time visiting local people and only spent their evenings and night in the Seminary—sleeping in a tiny loft upstairs.

Displayed are early colonial artefacts of everyday life including needle work and many pictures of local agriculture and industries including examples of cricket bats made at the Kumnick Cricket Bat Factory in operation from 1895—1956.



We saw the original Church with the elevated pulpit and the unique blue and white woodwork—very different to the later churches. Also interesting was the original cemetery built near, but uphill to the town's well - which had to be moved after people became infected from drinking its water.

The present day church was completed around 1994, built mostly by voluntary labour and was completely debt free when finished.

After the tour we all enjoyed lunch at the Lobethal Bakery.

Women's Fellowship

The Glynde Women's Fellowship meet on the 2nd Wednesday of the month, from February until November. We do not have a committee but have 2 different ladies who are the hostesses for each meeting plus a treasurer.

The Meeting consists of Bible study, led by Pastor Wayne, Morning Tea together with the office staff, lots of net-working and a short Business Meeting. We support the World Day of Prayer, have hosted it at our church, and in August we will be hosting the **Metropolitan North Zone Fellowship Rally (Thursday 16th August)**.

We raise money via trading tables (including the Sunday morning table) and catering for a variety of occasions. We have donated \$2,000 yearly to 19 organisations including missions, LCC Students, Aged Care, The Bible Society, Deaf Ministry and Lutheran Media Ministry. This year we have also given \$500 for transport of medical equipment to New Guinea and kneeling cushions for our church at a cost of \$1,500.

We are appreciating the new areas in our church—the lift, new toilet area and the up-graded kitchen (especially for our Sunday lunches and catering).

We would welcome with open arms any new faces to our group of 16 members.

Lighthouse Day



Lighthouses—a light that shines in the darkness to protect and alert. It sounds like something you could say about a friend, mentor, or even the Holy Spirit...

Lighthouses were commonly built in the most dangerous regions, those with the biggest storms, largest rocks and highest risk of danger. Originally, large fires were actually lit on top of the lighthouse building and polished metal used to 'beam' the light out to sea.

GPS technology is leading to the redundancy of Lighthouses. However, the church as a Lighthouse that beams out over its community will never be redundant.

Wednesday August 15th at Wesley Uniting Church, Kent Town, at 2pm.


Andrew Georg, organist, choir director, accompanist, will give a recital on the beautiful pipe organ; supporting artist is clarinetist, Katie Marshall.

Fascinating Documentary: For the Love of God

Some weeks ago this doco was shown at Modbury and the cinema was packed out. Those hundreds of viewers were just like me – spellbound for about an hour and a half while a most excellent production appeared on the screen. The film has an odd sub-title: *How the church is better and worse than you ever imagined*. It manages to trace 2000 years of the Christian Church's history, including the darker side of what has been done in the name of Christ - such as the Crusades, burning witches and not resisting the rise of Hitler.

On the plus side, the film shows how Christianity laid the foundation for human rights, and for qualities such as humility and compassion. For example, it was a *Christian* judge who proclaimed the guilt of the murderers at the Myall Creek massacre in the 1830s, one of the only times when whites were punished for crimes against aboriginal people.

This doco is suitable both for Christian people to know more about our history, and for non-Christians who have an open mind to learn. Its information is well-presented by 3 Australians, filmed on location in 11 countries and chock-full of interviews with dozens of experts, but not dry and academic-sounding. The Centre for Public Christianity (known as CPX), based in Sydney, spent some years completing this film. CPX is a non-profit Christian media company providing high quality, well-researched articles to the public, showing the relevance of Christianity today. Our world is often critical of the Christian church, or thinks it is irrelevant or else divisive. CPX thinks that Christianity still has something important to say about life's biggest questions.

One memorable moment from the film is an analogy between playing music and living an authentic Christian life. The same piece of music is played by a professional cellist and an amateur with almost no tuition. The contrast is obvious.

"Jesus gave us a beautiful tune. When Christians have played that tune well, great things happened: Hospitals were founded. The poor were cared for. Slavery was abolished. But when Christians played that tune badly, disastrous things happened. Crusades. Witch hunts. And racism."

From our Cross Cultural Coordinator...

I googled!

What is the meaning of “to be a lighthouse”?

This is what it said...

Lighthouses symbolize the way forward and help in navigating our way through rough waters whether those waters be financial, personal, business or spiritual in nature. Nothing else speaks of safety and security in the face of adversity and challenge quite the way a lighthouse does.

The description is good and would resonate with people no matter who they are – let’s face it, everyone has rough times in their lives, and everyone wants to feel safe and secure.

We returned recently from holidays in Sri Lanka – and yes, the scenery is amazing, the elephants and leopards were roaming and we could see them, and everything was great! But, I was more amazed by some stories

that were shared with us, and I am sure I will share them with you over the coming months...

For our trip we had a driver who was with us every day. His name is Rumaiz. When we first met him we were relieved that although his English wasn’t great, we could understand him fairly easily (unless he got excited and started talking too fast!) He told us he was born Muslim, which we just accepted.

Every morning that we left a hotel, we would go through the same banter from Rumaiz... everyone got passports, wallets and mobile devices! It was always fun. But, one morning when I walked up to him sitting in the foyer I saw he was concentrating on his phone. I walked up behind him about to say, we have our passports, wallets and devices.... but I just stopped as I heard from his phone, Hallelujah! He went to turn it off immediately, and I said no, please don’t... we know Jesus too! Well, you can imagine how the conversation changed from that moment.

Rumaiz was born Muslim, the eldest son. He fell in love with a native Sri Lankan woman whom he married. He was disowned by his parents and his inheritance was given to his younger brother. In later years Rumaiz with his wife built a new relationship with them all but it didn't change his position in the family. Once his parents died his brother gave him nothing, and he had to rebuild his life. He became a tourist driver and guide. Many of those he met were from Australia. One family told him about Jesus, and how Jesus could help him. Now Rumaiz and his family are on a new journey, learning about Jesus. Rumaiz told me that once he started talking to Jesus, good things started happening in his life!

Rumaiz would be there waiting for us every morning, waiting to talk and share, and to ask questions. You could see his love and excitement for God! As he navigated us along the narrow and dangerous roads of Sri Lanka the conversations would turn to God. Funny really, Rumaiz navigating us, and God navigating for us all! The night we were leaving, Rumaiz took us to his home where we met his wife and three sons and enjoyed a meal with them. We had managed to find a cross from a jeweller in a small village that we gave to him to keep with him as he travelled and navigated for others, and he gave us a

beautiful framed photo of us all.

Now, at home again, I can walk past that photo and see the shining light of Rumaiz.

Isn't God amazing! I thank God for the family before us who shared their story with him, and I thank God that He gave us the opportunity to share our lives with Rumaiz. Why did this happen to us? What a gift we were given – meeting him, and his family, and I pray that God used us to shine His light for Rumaiz.

You know, as we travelled and talked, I thought it was just like being here at Glynde. The opportunities to smile, say hello, listen, talk, to actually get to know the real person. And just like Rumaiz everyone has their own story to tell. It's easy to just see the outside, and not look inside at each other's hearts!

We can be a place of safety and security, just like the lighthouse, and we can shine brightly for Him, leading others gently and securely to God. Just as God safely leads us in our lives, we can shine for Him too.

Grant and I smile now as we go to the car, 'got passport, wallets, mobile devices!'

Being a Lighthouse in our Community

I've come to accept it is natural (and even good) to feel out of our depth at times, to feel under resourced for the enormity of the task or to feel overwhelmed by the storm.

In each situation, we are humbled. In hindsight we realise we were never supposed to manage it all and reminded that our faithfulness does not promise and is not dependant on a smooth sail, but by our willingness to embark on the journey in the first place.

Next year will mark 10 years since LCC Foster Care Services set sail for the second time; and as we draw closer to celebrating this milestone with you, we thank you for your continued partnership in mission, prayer and support.

We've seen a lot of change in 10 years of foster care; we've worked with different state governments, guided by an evolving understanding of childhood trauma and a landscape of changing legislation; we've grown closer as a team, witnessed families give above and beyond expectation and seen transformational change in the lives of children and young people we care for.

Unfortunately, one thing that has not changed is the demand for people to provide safe and nurturing homes for children when they are unable to live with their families. We know that fostering is not for everyone, and as the body of Christ we are not all called to do the same thing. But we are certainly all able to do something.

I'd like to take this opportunity to invite you to our next Foster Care Information Session. You may be interested in attending if you have thought about fostering as a possible next step in your journey. You may know another family who fosters, so you may be interested in some background information that might help you better support them. Or you may simply be interested in a deeper understanding of what we do so you can continue to support LCC in prayer. For any of these reasons, you would be very welcome at the session we are hosting upstairs on **Wednesday, 15 August 6.30-8.30pm.**

A beacon to ships in the night does not alter the depth we find ourselves in, it does not make the sea any calmer or the rocks any less dangerous – but it helps us navigate through all of that, prompting us to make the small changes necessary at the helm in order to change our direction.

Together, we continue to be a light in our community. We are vessels of life-transforming change when we offer what we have to vulnerable children and young people, a gift that can ultimately alter the course of their lives, one degree at a time.


