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# From the Chairperson ...

How are we united through Christ? As Christians, we are united through Christ in faith and shared beliefs. But first, some fun facts:

- Christians are the largest religious group in the world, and in 2015, made up 31% of Earth's 7.3 billion people (Pew Research Centre). Muslims number 2.3 billion and 1.2 billion are not affiliated with any religion.
- Lutherans number approximately 80 million over the world (3.35% of Christians), and 74.2 million are affiliated with the Lutheran World Federation (LWF). The Lutheran Church of Australia and New Zealand (LCANZ) has approximately 60,000 members and is an associate member of the LWF (rather than a full member).
- Papua New Guinea has the most Lutherans of any country in the Oceanic region - about 1.2 million people (20% of the population).

If we think about these statistics and our place in the global mission of Christ's Kingdom, then I think this gives us room to expand our view of who are our sisters and brothers in Christ. It also makes us think about what approaches we can take to fulfil the mission of the church given to us by Jesus to "Go and make disciples....".

It supports our vision to reach out to our community and to share our lives and our witness to God's love and presence in our small patch of a very big world.

It points to the slogan "Think global, act local" and the fact that despite the global reach of Christianity, it is the local acts of service in the simple opportunities to be a friend, a neighbour, a listening ear, a random act of kindness that provide the day to day miracles that unite us in Christ.

It means as a synodical church, the LCANZ, we should be open to considering how social and theological changes, globally and locally, should be part of growth in the opportunities for ministry in our congregations.

On the local scene, the Board for Ministry and the Executive Team have met in the last weeks. These groups, and other

committee and working groups, meet with prayer each month to support each other, share their news and to progress the ministries of the church.

### **Major news:**

- Installation of Pastor Henry Martinez as a part-time Assistant Pastor to our congregation. Welcome Henry, and we pray that your time will be a blessing to you and to us.
- Commencement of most mid-week and regular ministries. It is great to have the place buzzing Wednesday to Saturdays with activities that open our church to our local community. Barb Mattiske coordinates and attends many of these - pray for wisdom and guidance for all who lead and assist these activities.
- Pastor Wayne is leading a Lenten series on the movie "The Shack". We are grateful for his opening of the Word of God to us in new ways.
- Lighthouse for Kids is off to an energetic start. Our ministry to children and families is a vital part of what we do and who we are.
- The reconfiguration of the kitchen is well under way with David Stock coordinating a range of workers and trades to demolish the old cupboards, install a new ceiling, prepare for new tiles, cupboards, plumbing, electrical work, floor covering etc . It's a big job and it will be a wonderful new facility and will enhance the welcome we can extend to the many groups and occasions that use our kitchen as part of their ministry and hospitality. Please take the time to thank David Stock, Val Matters and their teams for making this all possible.
- Upcoming use of our church facilities as a pre-polling booth and then a polling booth on 17 March 2018.
- Requests for more pianists/organists

for the first service, and consideration being given to a policy for payment of relief or guest organists.

- Great excitement as John, Viv and Johanna brought baby Laurence to church for the first time (and less than one week old!) last Sunday.

In Christ we are united in these ministries. As we share the journey of Lent with the wider church and Christians everywhere - remembering Jesus' love and suffering, his death and the triumph of his resurrection. May Christ be with you always.

# From Pastor Wayne...

Hi!

Our theme for this month's @Glynde is **"The Global body of Christ"**. That's who we are as people from all over the world, people who have been baptised into union with Jesus as our Saviour, and who continue to trust in him as Saviour.

Listen to what Paul says about who we are in his letter to the Galatians:

**It is through faith that all of you are God's children (lit. "sons") in union with Christ Jesus. You were baptised into union with Christ, and now you are clothed, so to speak, with the life of Christ himself. So there is no difference between Jews and Gentiles, between slaves and free men, between men and women; you are all one in union with Christ Jesus (Gal. 3:26-28).**

I love the diagram in the Good News Bible that accompanies this passage.

It is a picture of **the arms of Jesus the Christ, encircling Christians of all nationalities on a globe of the world**

**Here at Glynde, there are many reminders of this "Global body of Christ" on a Sunday.** In our morning worship services, there are people from a whole host of different countries: South

Sudan, Korea, Iran, Malaysia, Sri Lanka, and so on. When the children gather for our Children's Message, this is particularly apparent. If you go up to Lighthouse, you will see the "Global body of Christ" learning more about Jesus, our Saviour and Lord, and about God, our dear Father in heaven.

Later on Sundays, if you stick around to 12.20 p.m., you will see **the Korean church** gathering to worship, and if you come in the early afternoon, often you will see the **South Sudanese people worshipping as a group.**

This is without mentioning **the Americans in our midst**, namely **Karleigh Crepin and Pastor Henry Martinez**. Karleigh is our second YAGM volunteer in the last couple of years: Karleigh has volunteered as a Young Adult in Global Mission, and she is serving her Lord here at this church and at LCC, Ingle Farm, from last September until around July of this year. We thank God for the gift of Karleigh, who by the way is also editing this edition of @Glynde. Thanks Karleigh.

Then there is Pastor Henry. You will see a fair bit of him in the next couple of years, as he serves here as a part-time assistant pastor. Henry was installed as a pastor here a couple of weeks ago on Feb

18<sup>th</sup>. He will assist in leading worship, preach to us on many occasions, and be involved in different aspects of ministry here. Welcome Henry, and God bless you, Kim and the boys, as you are involved in our Global ministry here.

**Drop in during the week, too, and you will see the wonderful possibilities that exist of us growing as “the Global body of Christ”.** On Wednesdays, there is Playgroup; on Thursday, there is Mainly Music; on Fridays, parenting and English classes and Coffee and Chat; on Saturday, our main English sessions. During the week, people from all over the world gather in our hall and in the foyer and elsewhere to play, to learn, and to enjoy one another’s company

**My dream, and the VISION of our church, is that these people may meet Jesus, and through Jesus know the God of the universe, and through Jesus become part of the “Global body of Christ”.** What a wonderful vision of what could happen here as God’s Spirit works in the hearts and minds of people who come here. It reminds me of that other great vision, the one that the Lord Jesus gave John as he meditated on God’s Word on the island of Patmos. Listen again to what John writes:

**After this I looked, and there was an enormous crowd – no one could count all the people! They were from every race, tribe, nation, and language, and they stood in front of the throne and of the Lamb, dressed in white robes and holding palm branches in their hands. They called out in a loud voice: “Salvation comes from our God who sits on the throne, and from the Lamb!”**

**All the angels stood round the throne, the elders, and the four living creatures. Then they threw themselves face downwards in front of the throne and worshipped God, saying “Amen! Praise, glory, wisdom, thanksgiving, honour, power, and might belong to our God for ever and ever! Amen! (Revelation 7:9-12).**

May God bless you and me in this new year as together we build one another up and encourage one another in our faith, and as together we reach out into our community with the Good News of God’s love, and His

forgiveness through Jesus. May God bless us as we “reveal and celebrate God’s love, so that **all** may know Jesus and worship *God through him*”, and so that **“the Global body of Christ”** grows here and elsewhere!

# Celebrations @Glynde!

Congratulations to John, Viv and Johanna Kupke on the arrival of their adorable new family member! Baby Lawrence Emmanuel Kupke arrived on Tues 20th Feb at 7:05pm. Lawrence weighted 3.31kg (7lbs5oz) and measured out to be 51cm long. Congratulations to all of the Kupkes, we are all excited to get to know our new brother in Christ!

## A Word from Ben Pitzner:

I would like to provide a quick update on how we went last year paying for the building project and loan. With the final drawdown coming in the second quarter of the year we had to make 3 payments on the loan. Each payment to be made by the end of each quarter is \$16,500. This being the case last year we paid \$49,500. The balance owing on the loan at the end of December 2017 was \$638,995.20.

A summary of the income is as follows:

You can see that we fundraised slightly over the amount that we budgeted for the year. We were slightly under the amount we budgeted from ongoing pledges which may have been simply due to timing and some people may have not commenced their giving until the project was completed. The Upfront Payment is under the amount, but this is due to the amount previously received. The \$640,000 is the entire amount of the amount pledged upfront. This is a promising start and we look forward to being able to continue meeting our targets in order to make the loan repayments. I intend to continue to provide updates on both the General and Building Budget in the Sunday Paper.

I would also like to point out that there were a number of Fundraising events which occurred in December. A summary is as follows:

## What is International Women's Day and why does it matter?

International Women's Day (March 8th) is a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. The day also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity. International Women's Day (IWD) has been celebrated for well over a century, with the first IWD gathering support by over a million people in Austria, Denmark, Germany and Switzerland. Prior to this the Socialist Party of America, United Kingdom's Suffragists and Suffragettes, and further groups campaigned for women equality. Today, IWD belongs to all groups collectively everywhere. IWD is not country, group or organisation specific.

Our culture talks a lot about what it means to be a woman, and with each generation we seem to constantly redefine what womanhood is and how women should function in that role.

In the global body of Christ, one of the areas that women make a significant contribution is interfaith relationships, activities and dialogue. As we celebrate IWD, we ap-

plaud women for their efforts to build interfaith understanding and respect – in their families, in their communities, in their workplaces, in places of worship and in their levels of leadership.

Women are often the ones who establish and nurture relationships with other faiths. One movement that achieves this is the Women's Interfaith Network (WIN). On March 8<sup>th</sup>, remember those women in your life that have nurtured your faith, taught you Sunday School, prayed with you, and walked beside you.

Well, last Friday I was definitely a part of the global classroom at Glynde! Since we commenced our mid week ministry groups this year, we have been advertising an education morning to discuss schooling in Adelaide.

Together we became a global classroom. Maybe not all believers in God, but definitely a group of people from different countries and cultures all wanting to know and understand the difference between public and private schools, and to try and understand the Australian curriculum.

We are so honoured at Glynde that God blesses our time together. To be together with 20 people from South Korea, China, Singapore, Palestine, Malaysia and Australia was truly being in Gods classroom! To be with people who have been in Australia for as little as 3 months but who want to be a part of this community is humbling.

Also to be a part of the conversation and questions was informative and yet inspiring.

For people to discuss how they see some schools as being different from others because God is the foundation, is special. For some, they do not understand who God is, but they see His love shine through in the teaching and the policies, and they want to be a part of that. They want their children to be a part of that.

It is important for us to show and share Gods' love with all who enter this place, so His love shines through here too, and they see that strong foundation of God.

Here is a little story from last week. One mum received a call from her

doctor that scared her... where did she go? She came to the church! She came to where she knew she was loved, where she knew people would pray for her. Where she doesn't quite understand it, but knows this is a place of safety, where arms surround her and hold her close. Gods' love was touching her, holding her, telling her He cares.

This is the global church of Christ. This is what we are a part of. This is what we are to share!

That classroom of many cultures is a classroom that is inviting. It is where it is safe to talk and be yourself. It is where we can offer more educational courses. Next week we start a new Parenting course for 2018, based upon the Alpha series. This classroom can now share God as the foundation of parenting and where we can celebrate culture and create new traditions within families. ## From Pastor Henry...

Hello people of Glynde Lutheran Church! I am grateful for the opportunity to join you in ministry and look forward to seeing the ways in which God is working among you. It will take a bit of time to get to know one another, but I'll take this opportunity to share a bit of myself with you.

Our family moved to Adelaide two years ago from Chicago. We called that city home for the past seven years, and it was the birthplace of both our boys, Silas (5) and Ezra (3). My wife, Kim is ordained in the Evangelical Covenant Church (a denomination that isn't present in Australia) and had been working in the global mission department. I had been working at the offices of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America on the World Hunger team. On that team I was responsible for the production of hunger education resources for use in congregations and youth groups. Though I would not have seen myself in the position five or ten years ago, it was a good role for me in the sense that I used two disciplines I had been trained in: education and theology. Actually, I wouldn't have seen myself in Australia either.

In fact, the opportunity to come to Australia wasn't even on our radar until August 2015, just 6 months before we arrived here. But I'll rewind this a little bit first. A year after graduating from university I decided that I would love to live somewhere totally different from my home state of Arizona where I had spent my whole life. I looked into doing some sort of volunteer work abroad for a year or two and researched what opportunities the church had.

I ended up serving in Young Adults in Global Mission (the same program Kim and I coordinate in Australia) in Edinburgh, Scotland. During my volunteer year in Scotland I worked at Bethany Community Centre, a residential facility for men battling chemical dependencies. I had many duties, but my main job was befriending the men of the centre. These friendships developed over meal preparation, chess games and outings around the city. After that year I decided that seminary was going to be the next thing I did in life. I chose Fuller Seminary because I would get to interact with peers from different Christian traditions and it had a significant international student body as well. That is where Kim and I met.

In the following years, I was invited to share my experience during training events for subsequent groups of volunteers through the program. One year the director of the program told me that they were looking to setup a new program in Australia and encouraged me to apply. At that time Kim and I were looking at congregational ministry and hadn't even considered leaving the country. But we committed it to prayer and conversation... and here we are, thankful to have been considered and glad we said yes.

Our boys enjoy their lives here in Australia and have quickly become fans of cricket and footy. Every now and then Silas says he misses the snow, so he still has some Chicago in him. So far the plan is to be here for another two years, though that depends of course on visa status. We've currently lodged an application for our next visa, so if you could join us in prayer that the new visa is granted we would appreciate it.

As Pastor Wayne has mentioned, my role at Glynde works in conjunction with the call to my current position. As part of my call the expectation is that I am involved in regular local ministry in some way, and this arrangement has been the product of conversation with the LCA. As far as my ministry at Glynde is concerned, currently I'm aiming to be in the office one morning a week (usually Wednesday or Thursday). Because of my work responsibilities and travel schedule, this means I won't be at Glynde a few Sundays here and there. Kim is keeping her ministry commitments at other sites, so you probably won't see her or the boys as frequently. I trust that in time we'll get to know one another and I look forward to walking alongside you.

Thank you for the warm welcome that you have shown so far.
