
Christmas Eve practice. That Sunday, there will be only one worship service: a combined Readings and Carols service at 9.00 a.m.

We give thanks for those who contributed ideas and time to our Vision Day in October and for those who attended our AGM last Sunday. At the AGM we affirmed those who have served in all positions and roles within our church community in 2018 and elected the following office bearers for 2019: Chairperson: Helene Schulz Vice-chairperson: Jonathan Prenzler Secretary/Public Officer: Lyall Kupke Assistant Treasurer: Fleur Kupke Maintenance/Security Officer: Grant Wilksch

Consultants: Linden Huxtable, Sharyn Schubert

Thank you to all those who accepted nominations for our Board for Ministry teams and the many other groups and roles that are formed to breathe life and care and fellowship into our worship and activities that shape our faith, our outreach and our community. A Book of Reports has been distributed which outlines highlights, achievements and challenges of our ministry teams - copies are available from the office if you have not had a chance to read these reports.

Business discussed at the AGM included the repair of the pipe organ (scheduled for early 2019), review of the constitution (the final draft was distributed for comment and will be presented for adoption at a special meeting to be convened early next year), repainting of the hall in January (thanks to donations from the Craft Group) and an update on tax-deductible donations to LCC towards our redevelopment project. Our Treasurer outlined the new budget for 2019 - this is a deficit budget of \$12,000 and while our general finances can support this deficit in the short term, it is not a sustainable position for the longer term. We are all encouraged to review and increase our support for the weekly church budget if we can.

A proposal relating to holding a forum for members of our faith community to express their feelings about the decisions at the recent General Convention of Synod and the ongoing dilemma and hurt within the LCA regarding the ordination of women was supported. The Executive and Board for Ministry will plan and hold this forum in the new year.

So, as we end this year and plan for the next, we are grateful for all who contribute to make this a special place. May we count our blessings every day, or as the Message version of Matthew 5:5-6 proclaims:

You're blessed when you're content with who your are - no more, no less. That's the moment you find yourself proud owners of everything that can't be bought. You're blessed when you've worked up a good appetite for God. He's food and drink in the best meal you'll ever eat

Shalom, and every blessing for this Advent and Christmas season.

Can my child go to communion

Well, the short answer is "Yes, he or she can!" For a long time now, this has been encouraged in our church. Way back as far as 1981, the Lutheran Church of Australia at its General Synod passed a resolution encouraging children to take the Lord's Supper prior to their Confirmation of their faith. Children as young as 10 years of age were encouraged to partake in the Lord's Supper, after a brief course of instruction by their Pastor.



In recent times, debate has occurred about the age at which a child can be admitted to the Lord's Supper. At recent Pastors' Conferences, and at our recent General Synod in Sydney, discussion has happened even with regard to Infant Communion, *a common practice in the Orthodox church*. General Synod has voted not to introduce the practice of infant communion in the LCA. It did however endorse the church's existing practice of offering the sacrament to children 'at the earliest appropriate age'.

The report of the LCA's Commission on Theology and Interchurch Relations (CTICR) as far back as 2013 states that "it does recommend that the age of first communion be significantly lowered". But it did not specify an age at which children could receive the sacrament, **"since the decision as to the earliest appropriate age should be made by the pastor in consultation with the parents".**

All this means that your child can come to the Lord's Supper when you as a parent think that your child is ready to receive the Lord's Supper. Personally as a parent, I have always been of the opinion that since the Lord's Supper is a gift from the Lord Jesus to those participating, I would want my children to commune with their Lord as soon as possible, or as Synod affirmed "at the earliest appropriate age"

In practical terms:

*Chat to your child about this, and make a decision based on your discussion. *Talk to the pastor about your situation *Attend a brief "Introduction to the Lord's Supper" run by the pastor *Your child will be then admitted to the Lord's Supper.

Conversation between God and St. Francis

"Passing the Baton"



That's the theme that will be explored over the weekend of the Lutheran Women's Retreat in mid-January at ALC in North Adelaide. It's an annual get-together of women from all around the state, some of whom have been faithful attenders for decades. I always used to read the ad in our local church paper and think to myself, 'I should book in for that one day'. But I never did - until 5 or 6 years ago. I found it to be a good experience, both socially and spiritually, so I've continued to attend.

This year we have a fairly young chaplain, Pastor Nigel Rosenzweig, who works part-time with *Grow Ministries*, the arm of the national church that is there to help congregations with ministry to children and families.
