*On Saturday, January 17th, at the Warradale Lutheran church from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., we held a **Leadership/Ministry retreat** based on Acts, Chapters one to four. We focused on three things which flowed from these chapters, that:

*God wants the Church to be multicultural

*God wants the Church to be a place of community, fellowship, and learning

*God wants the Church to be outreaching

It was a relaxing day of fellowship, study, and prayer, with a shared lunch in a venue close to the beach. God blessed us as we gathered with one another around His Word.

*This Sunday, February 1st, we will have a **Visioning Day** from 1 p.m. in the afternoon until 4 p.m. after our community lunch together. *Please come along and join us, as we get together in small groups and talk about different aspects of our ministry here, and our visions and dreams for the future, visions and dreams that flow from our Mission Statement and our Inreach and Outreach goals. Our main ideas will then become our objectives for this year, 2015.*

Our Mission statement is "To reveal and



celebrate God's love, so that all may know Jesus and worship Him". And the Goals that flow from our Mission statement are twofold:

Inreach goal:

To encourage, upbuild, and equip one another, so that we may grow in our faith and become more the outreaching, serving people that God wants us to be.

Outreach goal:

To reach out as a congregation and as individuals to the many hurting and lost people around us with the good news of God's love and forgiveness.

Come along this Sunday afternoon and share your thoughts, and your visions, and your dreams as to how God wants us to put His mission into action.

*This year, we will be seeking to employ a **0.4 Cross Cultural Coordinator** for at least 3 years to help us reach out to the many people, from different cultures, whom we are contacting through our

bridges to the community around: through Playgroup, Mainly Music, Lighthouse, English classes, Markets, Worship, Craft and so on. Please pray that God will be able lead a suitable person to apply for his position. to fill this position by early to mid March.

*We are blessed to have Colin Simpkin as a Vicar here, a pastor in training, for the first half of this year. Please continue to care for Colin. and his wife Tanya, and Bradley, and pray for them as they spend time with us in our ministry for the Lord. They are, and will be, a wonderful blessing from the Lord for us.

Colin will be preaching once a month, with two in a row in May, and leading worship most Sundays, as he prepares to be a pastor of the Lutheran Church of Australia. As well as this, he will visit in homes and in hospitals, take the Lord's Supper out to people as a Lay Distributor, be involved in teaching the Christian faith, and be involved in most aspects of our church's ministry.

*Please glance at the Worship Calendar at the rear of this @ Glynde, and note dates for Thanksgiving, Ash Wednesday, and Lent. This vear again we will have worship on Ash Wednesday, Feb 18th, at 7 p.m., and we will have a Midweek Lenten Bible study on Thursdays over the next four weeks, using Tim Keller's DVD and study on The Reason for God: Conversations on Faith and Life. There will be a morning study at 11.00 a.m. after "Mainly Music", and an evening study at 7 p.m.

*May God bless us as together we build one another up and encourage one another in our faith, and as together we reach out into our community with the Good News of God's love, and His forgiveness through Jesus. May God bless us as we "reveal and celebrate God's love, so that all may know Jesus and worship him".

Mainly Music has been going for less than a year and I can't believe how well it has been received in our community. The amount of new people who have come has been very encouraging and indicative of how good a ministry tool this is. There have been very few weeks, if any, where no new

people have attended.

I love the songs and rhymes that I've learnt so far - I've even been using them when I work in the child care centre. They are so engaging and fun for the children. Not only that, but it's educational - you can see the learning that happens. Whether it's the actions to a song; gaining some understanding of rhythm and rhyme; or, learning how to share the toys after Morning Tea! Those ride along toys get a real workout on a Thursday morning!

It is heartening to see how children and adults alike respond to the music and rhymes we do each week. Being out the front, I get to see it all! Even when I feel silly or vulnerable, I can see that they are enjoying

it. That's what motivates me to keep Mainly Music going.

It's been wonderful getting to know families and seeing them come back. The relationships we are building are so valuable and I hope this can continue. I had a friend come along to our last session and she brought someone who has children. Her comment to me later that day was: 'My friend loved this morning as people talked to her. The last one she went to, no one spoke to her.' It's as simple as talking to someone.

We have a great group of ladies who come in each week to cut up fruit, set up tables and chairs and bring out some toys for the children. There may also be some washing and drying of dishes involved.....! They also happen to be pretty good at baking - we've been

very spoilt with some delicious cakes, savoury muffins and biscuits! Lots of mums comment on how delicious it is! Their support is invaluable and we could not do it without them!





We've also got helpers who do a whole bunch of other stuff like: set up the cushions and rugs; set up the chairs and tables; greet people; take coffee orders; make coffees; hang out with the children at Morning Tea; help out with last minute cutting out; and are generally very supportive of Mainly Music.

I might be the person up the front, but there is no way that any of

Jesus' love would be spread the way it is at Mainly Music without all of these supportive people. How blessed are we all to be connected with such a worthy event. If you know anyone with young children, encourage them to give it a go.

Many thanks to all who continue to encourage and support us at Mainly Music - feel free to come along and check it out sometime, you never know, you might find yourself enjoying it too.

"Bushfires & Glynde connections"

Just 2 days into the New Year it was a hot, hot day and what so many feared would happen, happened! A bushfire broke out! This fire burnt for a week resulting in great loss of property: houses, sheds, fences, and animals. Kangaroos and koalas lost their habitat. Volunteer fire-fighters from SA, Victoria and NSW fought the fire saving many properties. Thankfully no human lives were lost.

There were stories of dedicated firefighters, stories of great escapes, stories of devastating loss, stories of ingenuity, stories of good friends coming to the rescue - the list goes on!

Lyle and Anne Bartel's son and his family faced the fires. Anne writes: Our son, his wife and family recently moved to Upper Hermitage to have more space to accommodate his business as a builder.

They shifted in just before Christmas and soon after that went to Yorke Peninsula for a short break. Within days they had to return because news of a fire in the Upper Hermitage area indicated that the fire was dangerously close to their property (it

reached a fence that was a metre or two from his house). They were not permitted to enter the area, so stayed with friends who lived a lot closer than Mum and Dad!!

When they were eventually permitted to return they felt God's protection and blessing, not just because their house, contents and sheds were saved, but also by the support given by friends, fam-



ily and Emergency Services (they probably saved his house).

Their start in a new house was literally a baptism of fire and they are now in the process of re-establishing fences, irrigation pipes and clearing damaged trees.

We are grateful for God's protection.

At Humbug Scrub Sharon and Wain run the Kangaroo Pouch Sanctuary. They



evacuated the children early to grandma's house. Then Sharon evacuated saving, 'I want our children to have one parent left'. Wain stayed on to defend the property and the 40 orphaned animals living there. On the first night the fire bypassed them by less than a kilometre, but by the next afternoon they were under attack again. Wain said, 'It was really hard to know what to do because the fire seemed to be coming from two or three directions at once, and the wind kept changing.' A fireball raced through a neighbour's property in less than a minute. Wain and Sharon lost most fences and sheds, but thankfully the house was saved. However now the cleanup starts. Pictured are wild kangaroos, who have lost all their natural habitat ering down his blessings.' feasting on donated hay. Wain and Sharon are overwhelmingly grateful for this support knowing that they will need to keep feeding animals until the winter rains come in.

Then there is the branch of the Bradtke family. Peter and Courtney were getting married and the reception was at the Glen Ewin Estate. At 9.00 am they were told that the Estate was off limits and all the preparations already at the Estate could not be accessed. As Gary said, 'The world was upside down and inside out - if Court-

ney had then been placed into a water bomber aircraft she could have single handedly put out the fire with her tears'. Anyhow it was decided that the wedding would go ahead; it would be held in Gary and Deb Bradtke's backyard. Family, friends, neighbours rolled up with everything that makes up a wedding. The yard was transformed, food was supplied. 'It was a procession of cars and trailers arriving and departing,' said Gary. Gary continued, 'By 5.00 pm all that was needed was the Bride and she arrived right on time along with the rain! No one begrudged it raining and the hope was that it would fall on the fires as well. It rained lightly until the ceremony stopped – it was God show-

Our thoughts and prayers continue to be with those affected by the bushfire in the Adelaide Hills.

Lutheran Community Care staff have been working to ensure emergency relief services are available to those who have lost or had to leave their homes behind. They will continue to provide resources for the recovery efforts in the coming weeks.

In response to specific requests, the Lu-

Some readers will remember Mark and Beth Kaesler being at Glynde in 2003 when Mark was our vicar. Recently their son Paul phoned our church office 'out of the blue', offering to bring a team of practical helpers to do some landscaping.



Paul is in his fifth year of studying medicine, and a leader in the interdenominational *Big Week Out*, a movement that has grown over the past decade or so. Generally the leaders are uni students, and the team members secondary school students. Their aim is to show God's love through their service.

His offer was gladly accepted, as we knew of 2 yards in need of some muscle power. Both Simon and Rebecca's family and Tibitha's family moved into community housing properties last spring. Because the properties were brand new, the

standard practice is that only the front yard is landscaped at hand over, leaving the back yard looking rather like a desert.

Paul and his team made a good start in transforming these 'deserts' by doing some digging at both places, sectioning off an area for future vegie gardens, and sowing lawn seed. Simon's yard is large, so they also planted water-wise shrubs and ground cover plants, surrounded by bark chips.

With continued watering and care, the yards can grow into attractive gardens. There is scope for further development in the future, which our own church family could help with.

What a thrill to hear about these willing young workers! Their t-shirt slogan says it all _ 'Young people inspired by Jesus to serve'.




Barry Freund & his twin brother, Phil, turned 70.


