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# From Pastor Wayne...



*It's winter...  
But spring is coming!*

Well, we're past June 21<sup>st</sup>... the shortest day of the year has been and gone. Now each day is slightly longer, and spring is just around the corner.

Well almost! The reality is that we still have a couple of months of winter before spring comes 😊 But we will have some sunny days in the months of winter ahead, and the sunshine of those days points us to the coming of spring.

Why am I prattling on about winter and the coming of spring? Because that is the theme of this @Glynde magazine. I think that it's a good theme, because it sort of sums up our life situation.

Often our life seems quite wintry. We have days when we groan inwardly

because of the pressures of life and the hardships of living. It reminds me of Paul's words to the Christians in Rome: **For we know that up to the present time all of creation groans with pain, like the pain of childbirth. But it is not creation alone which groans; we who have the Spirit as the first of God's gifts also groan within ourselves, as we wait for God to make us his children, and set our whole being free (Rom. 8:22-24).**

Nevertheless, we still have the sunshine of God's love, and His forgiveness through Jesus, shining on us even on the darkest of winter's days. None of us need live in the cold grip of winter. Each of us can have peace of mind and joy inside us, and we can face the wintry weather of the future with a smile on our face. We

can do this because we know through Jesus, God's Son, that we are loved and forgiven by God, and that God holds us in the palm of His hand, and won't ever desert us.

As Paul says in his letter to the Christians in Rome, shortly after his words above, *and he can write these words because he knows the heart of God through Jesus, God's Son: For I am certain that nothing can separate us from God's love: neither death nor life, neither angels nor other heavenly rulers or powers, neither the present nor the future, neither the world above nor the world below – there is nothing in all creation that will ever be able to separate us from the love of God which is ours through Christ Jesus our Lord (Rom. 8:38-39).*

God "will make us his children, and set our whole being free". Spring is coming. Spring will come, and winter will come to an end one day, when Jesus comes again in glory and ushers in God's Kingdom. Then God will rule totally and utterly and "there will be no more death, no more grief or crying or pain". All things will be made new (Rev. 21:4,5).

We know that the full warmth of Spring is coming because of the promises of Jesus to this effect, promises confirmed and validated by God's raising of Jesus from the dead. Let me remind you of a couple of these promises:

**\*"Don't be worried and upset", Jesus told his disciples. "Believe in God and believe also in me. There are many rooms in my Father's house, and I am going to prepare a place for you... And after I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to myself, so that you will be where I am" (John 14:1-3).**

**\*Jesus said to Martha, "I am the resurrection, the One who raises the dead, and the life, the One who gives eternal life. Whoever believes in me will live, even though he dies physically; and whoever lives and believes in me will never ever die spiritually (John 11:25,26).**

Sure, it's winter...But spring is coming! May God bless us as we let the Son shine through us, and as we bring the warmth of God's love, and His forgiveness through Jesus, into the lives of people around us.

Worship is sustained and nurtured by Pastor Wayne, our organists and music groups, prayer leaders, readers, the Korean church and the Sudanese community. I thank God for Pastor Wayne, for Barb (Acting Cross Cultural Coordinator) and Angeline (Acting Executive Assistant) as they work among us. We continue to pray for Tamara during her period of leave. Our vision to grow these and other ministries has led us to seek to develop a Master Plan for redeveloping our church facilities.



In May 2015 we had a congregational meeting where the following motion was passed: *that we ascertain the capacity of the congregation to increase its commitment to the redevelopment and upgrade of Glynde Lutheran Church and facilities to determine whether it is possible to proceed with Option 1 or Option 2.* These options are outlined as follows:

**Table 1: Cost of redevelopment options**

Option 1	All works for Areas A, B and C	\$1,506,945
Option 2	Area A and Area B with cost saving modifications (all structural work for A and B completed)	\$1,295,853
Option 3	Only Area A with cost saving modifications	\$1,002,012

## **Areas A, B and C**

As a result, a fresh request for financial support to help provide information to enable a decision to be made was put forward. It has been wonderful to see further substantial commitments towards the project. We also received further (unexpected) funds from the Electoral Commission for the use of our facilities as a polling booth for the election and from LCC for building work relating to the reconfiguration of the upstairs offices (special thanks to Klaus Schulz). We are now in a strong position to consider our options - and will decide this at our meeting on Sunday July 3rd.



Option 1 would appear to be beyond our reach, but a recommendation is being made to support Option 2. Our community fund raising for our facilities has been very active in the past weeks. The changes needed to accommodate the Electoral Commission has required great flexibility and cooperation from staff and groups that use the hall and church offices. Our nave has doubled as a venue for Mainly Music and English classes. Playgroup has also needed to relocate.

A special thank you to those who ensured our monthly markets could still operate last Saturday. The generous loan of marquees from Good Shepherd Lutheran Primary School transformed part of our car park into an impressive line of stalls selling everything from honey to jewellery to handmade gifts. People have also held pop-up stalls during the week as fund raising ventures during the pre-polling. The contribution of time, donations of goods for stalls, cooking sausages... put simply, the willingness to do whatever it takes is a great blessing in any community, and this quality has been shining brightly at Glynde.

The number of opportunities to share our faith and the life of our community has also been a blessing. As one person handing out "how to vote" cards commented, "The message of this place is far better than anything that we have to say!"

The next months are likely to be equally busy! Let us continue to pray for this project, but also to care and think of each other as we serve God in this place. Let us remember to share our love for Jesus with others, to care for those who are sick or vulnerable and to pray for all who travel in the coming months.

Klaus and I will also be away for part of July and most of August. Please contact Jonathan Prenzler, Vice Chairperson, in my absence.

However it wasn't long before the Hall resounded with howls of laughter. The performance of Cinderella had begun. Cinderella (Diane) was at the ball dancing with Prince Charming (Pastor Wayne), while the ugly sisters (Neil and Lyall) jealously looked on.



But then the plot thickened; Cinderella fled in accordance with the traditional plot, but those dastardly sisters pinched Cinderella's shoe and replaced it with one of their own. The plot got uglier with the Prince chopping off heads and Cinderella falling out of love with the prince (after all, he chops off heads for fun!). **Extract from Val's speech:**

On Thursday 10<sup>th</sup> June 1926 at 3pm the first Women's meeting was held and called the Lutheran Women's Guild. The meetings began with devotions, followed by Bible study, generally by the residing Pastor.

We have supported visiting of Nursing Homes and Homes for disadvantaged people, especially during Pastor and Mrs Zweck's ministry. This became an important ministry of the Women's Guild. Over the years this type of visiting and caring has continued and in later years Stephen's Terrace and Carmel House was included. These folk enjoyed the Bible



study and particularly the home made afternoon tea!

The Guild was proactive in catering for a large variety of functions including trading tables at shopping centres and also running a

second-hand shop called "One More Time".

In 1994 the Guild became known as the Glynde Women's Fellowship. Over the years we have supported many missions under the banner of LWSA and LWA. We presently raise \$2000 per year for missions as well as contributing to our congregation in various ways when and as needed.

In the past we have trialled morning, afternoon and evening meetings. We also had a young women's group for several years between 1971 and 1973. One of the aims of the Fellowship was to encourage the interest of our younger women in our congregation.

We now have a programme for our monthly meetings hosted by two different members who act as President and Secretary at that meeting and also host the morning tea. This has been surprisingly successful and because of this we have been able to continue. We enjoy our Bible studies by Pastor, the fellowship with each other and the activities connected with the LWSA and LWA.

God has truly blessed us during these 90 years!



## From our Cross Cultural Coordinator...

### *The winters of life...*

Gosh, where do you start with a heading like this?

Every single person has a story to share. Every single person has had winters in their life... some darker winters than others. But for every single person, it is their winter, their story, their distress, and to every person it is huge in their life.

I know for me, it was the diagnosis of cancer. I thought my life was about to end. The deepness of that hole I fell into was huge. One of my girls had married, but not the youngest... would I see her married, would I ever see grandchildren?

#### *What was God's plan for me?*

But, do you know what – God did have a plan for me, and God did hold me, and He did listen to me, and He did put people in my life to see me through to the “spring and summer” in my life.

I remember talking to Rebecca and Simon, from our Sudanese community, who shared the danger of escaping from the war areas of Sudan to a refugee camp, of hiding in a truck as they crossed the border, not knowing if they would be found and killed! What a dark winter that must have been. But the joy of spring in that Refugee camp would have been the highlight of their lives.

For many who attend Playgroup and Mainly Music, English Classes and even Coffee and Chat, they have experienced the winters of life, as have most of you reading this. I know that the people I chat with throughout the week often share of the decision to leave their homeland and come to Australia, and the heart ache and loneliness that comes with that decision.

God has given us the opportunity to be a part of their "Spring." You know it doesn't take much to say hello, or to ask how you are going, and sometimes, we may not even know it, but that could be the difference in that person's life. Today at Playgroup, we had a map, and shared where we came from... Do you know, there were 9 different countries! We have so much to learn from each other, and so much to give each other. And so much to share; for the families from those 9 countries, we here at Glynde can welcome them as part of our church family - through Church 4 kids and our multi cultural services. We can share through the morning tea that is provided at Mainly Music, and to which many of you contribute, and we thank you, or by listening to people at Mainly Music, Playgroup or Coffee and Chat. We do not know what opportunities may

arise to share Gods love and word - to help the season move from winter to spring... but just as God was there for me and for you in our darkest winters, He is there to celebrate the joy of Spring.

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## Henry Olonga, Cricket and Faith

Seldom has Men's Brekky looked quite like this! A truly scrumptious brekky with true food for the soul - the interview conducted by Michael with Henry Olonga.

Henry was the first black cricketer to play test cricket for Zimbabwe. However, accomplished as he was as a cricketer, (a fast bowler of ferocious, although not always accurate, speed) he is best known for the courageous political



stance he took when he, and team mate Andy Flower, wore black armbands to mourn the death of democracy under Robert Mugabe.

Why did he do this? Henry simply replied that if you are a Christian, your conscience dictates that you must do certain things. "I got to the point where, as a Christian, I felt like I needed to speak out against some of human abuses, rigged elections, and more, that had happened." Henry, at the prime of his career, paid the price for his principles. Soon after he was forced off the national team and had to go into exile after receiving death threats. He has never returned to Zimbabwe.

We were all uplifted through this man of faith. Henry and his Australian wife Tara now live in Adelaide with their two children.

# An update from Upstairs...

To acknowledge the suffering of vulnerable children around the world who are victims of physical, mental or emotional abuse and/or neglect; and to celebrate individuals and organisations around the world who work to protect and preserve the rights of children, the United Nations promote the International Day of Innocent Children Victims of Aggression on June 4 each year.

Where our South Australian child protection legislation meets the work of Lutheran Community Care Alternative Care Services (LCC ACS) and the servant hearted love of our foster carers, there is an innocent child or young person who has experienced abuse and/or neglect, some of whom require protection and stability in a home separate from their own biological family.

In the last 12 months LCC ACS received over 1,400 referrals from Families SA seeking placements for children and young people needing a home and approximately 1/3 of these children identify as Aboriginal.

The good news is we are not alone- Anglicare, Life Without Barriers, Key Assets, Aboriginal Family Support Services and Centacare are other agencies who also provide foster care, family preservation programs and reunification services throughout Adelaide and surrounds. The diversity and teamwork of all foster care agencies servicing our local regions is essential to the success of our greater child protection system in South Australia.

Since re-establishing our foster care program in 2009, LCC ACS have grown to support 105 foster families caring for 121 children and young

people in care across metropolitan Adelaide, the Barossa Valley and the Adelaide Hills. To service these regions LCC ACS is now operating over three sites; Glynde, Pasadena and Gawler.

Our significant expansion over the years has led to the recent appointment of our Senior Manager Rod Squires, and additional staff across the service in our Recruitment, Assessment, Training, Placement and Support teams. As a team of 21 across these five primary functions of LCC ACS we answer the heartfelt questions of enquirers, train and up skill applicants and support foster families when they are approved as registered carers by the Department of Education and Child Development.

We are encouraged and inspired on a daily basis by our extraordinary foster carers, who provide such amazing care to the children and young people who are placed with them. Our carers come in all different shapes and sizes in terms of the make up of their family; we have couples with and without children, and single people with and without children. Our carers are generally between 25 and 70 years of age and have varying degrees of work commitments.

The four equally important types of care have different qualities. We have respite carers, who volunteer a weekend or two a month to build an ongoing and enriching relationship with a child or young person while their long-term carers have a break. We have emergency carers, who are flexible and ready to take on the care of children with very little notice, and provide them with the love and stability they need when first removed from their

birth families. We have short-term carers, who care for children and young people for one to two years while their birth families receive support to have their children safely returned to their care. As you can imagine, this one to two year period in a child's life is marked by significant uncertainty, highlighting the importance of the foster carer's consistent love and nurturing. We also have long-term carers, who invest in the lives of children and young people by caring for them until the age of 18 and possibly beyond.

While each type of care presents its own unique rewards and challenges, what stays the same is the nature of the environment that the carer provides; nurturing, patient, stable and safe. In this environment children and young people can thrive and begin to heal from the trauma, abuse and neglect they have often sustained.

To provide homes like this for as many children and young people as we can, we are always looking for new foster carers to join the LCC ACS family. If you have thought about fostering then we encourage you to take the next step. Get in touch with a foster care agency, like LCC, and request an information pack or attend an information session.

*'Being a foster carer is all about providing children with the stability to grow and bloom into the beautiful young people they deserve to be' – LCC ACS Long Term Carer.*

However, foster care is not always the right fit for a family, and timing is important. For those without the capacity to foster, maybe you know someone who might be interested in fostering; pass on the information and spread the word about the need for foster carers.

We also appreciate your prayers and ask that you will continue to pray for the ongoing work we are doing on behalf of the Lutheran Church in South Australia and Northern Territory. We thank God for His provision across LCC and we look forward to facing our future of challenges and opportunities together with renewed strength. Thank you Glynde congregation for your efforts in upgrading the LCC ACS office environment and for sharing coffee, fellowship and weekly devotions with us. Finally, all of us here at LCC ACS extend the biggest of thanks to all the foster carers in our community. Your dedicated and passionate work is changing the lives of the most vulnerable children and young people, and for this we are very grateful.


