After all this is the one thing we have in common, why not embrace the opportunity to grow your relationship with each other and our loving Father? He longs for you to spend time with Him.

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# From Pastor Wayne...

\*Hi! This edition of @ Glynde has its focus on forming “Faith Families” in our church community, which is one of our objectives for VISION 2016.

Our **Mission Statement** reads: “To reveal and celebrate God’s love, so that all may know Jesus, and worship *God through him*”.

And the **Inreach goal** that flows from this is:

“To encourage, upbuild, and equip one another, **so that we may grow in our faith** and become the more outreaching, serving people that wants us to be”.

**Is this happening? Are you and I growing in our faith, our faith in God as our dear Father, and in Jesus as our Saviour and Lord?** Sure, it’s happening as we worship together and hear God’s Word and receive the Lord’s Supper, and as we read God’s Word and pray in our private devotions.

And it happens as we gather together in **our Home Groups, or Small Groups....** Or does it? Well, it used to.... Home Groups became part of our church communities from about the late 1980s



onwards, as people recognised that as in early church, there is great value in getting together in homes, eating together, and spending time around God’s Word together (*Acts 2:43-47*).

**But in more recent times, the number of Home Groups has diminished in our church communities.** It is certainly true here at Glynde, where hardly any Home Groups are still meeting, *and it is true in most church communities in our modern age....* In our busy society, where we work long hours and are often tired at night, going out to a regular Home Group has become a rarity.

**One of our objectives for VISION 2016 was that we promote “Faith Families” in our church community, as a way in which “we may grow in our faith”.** A Faith family is made up of brothers and sisters in God. It may consist of husband and wife; Dad, Mum, and the children; an extended biological family of people who are closely related to one another; a group of friends; a group of people living in the same locality; or a group of people of similar ages or people with similar

interests or circumstances; and so on.

**These Faith Families meet together for a meal, and follow the meal with FAITH 5 time.** “Faith 5” is described on the bookmark which is available in the foyer of our church, and it involves the following aspects:

- SHARE your highs and lows
- READ a Bible verse or story
- TALK about how the Bible reading might relate to your highs and lows
- PRAY for one another’s highs and lows
- BLESS one another

Faith Families are an alternative to Home Groups: they provide you with a non-threatening way to chat about your faith with one another, and encourage one another in your walk with Jesus.

Some suggestions for starting a “Faith Family” are as follows:

\*If you are **a married couple without children**, or *whose children have left the nest*, stay at the table after the meal with your spouse and use FAITH 5: share your highs and lows with one another, read a short Bible passage, discuss it *particularly with reference to your highs and lows*; pray for one another; and then finally bless one another.

\*If you are **a family of Dad, and Mum, and the children**, share with one another your highs and lows, maybe read a chapter from *The Beginner’s Bible* or a section from the Bible, chat about it, pray for one another, and bless one another.

\*If you meet

regularly as **an extended family**, after eating together, start using FAITH 5 as a way of talking together about your life, of hearing what God has to say to you, of praying together, and of blessing one another.

\*If you live on your own, **invite some friends from the congregation around for a meal, or for afternoon tea**, and have a FAITH 5 time at the end of the meal, or the afternoon tea, or whatever.

\*If you have **a group of friends who regularly meet together**, arrange a FAITH 5 time as part of the games night, or the cards get-together, or the social interaction.

**We want to have as many “Faith Families” as we can in our church community**, as another way in which “we may grow in our faith”, and grow as disciples of our Lord Jesus.

**\*May God bless us as together we build one another up and encourage one another in our faith**, and as together we reach out into our community with the Good News of God’s love, and His forgiveness through Jesus. May God bless us as we “reveal and celebrate God’s love, so that **all** may know Jesus and worship *God through him*”.

# From the Chairperson

As a matter of faith....

# From our Cross-cultural Coordinator...


This month I met a young mum at Playgroup... She looked attractive and confident, and upon speaking with her she was obviously well educated and had held a high position in her work life. Now, she is a mum of two young children... She is from China and is in Adelaide with her husband and children as his work has brought them here. They have no family here, they know no one, and this young mum is lonely and scared to even venture out... Isn't it funny how looks can be so deceiving! We all hide thoughts and secrets, and at times we are all lonely. Yet, we all have something special to share, and we are all special!

For the young mum at Playgroup, how wonderful it is to meet others and discover you are all feeling the same emotions. I invited this mum to our coffee and chat morning. This is where Glynde people have the opportunity to meet her – you could talk to her! You could share your life's journey together. God has given each one of us this opportunity and gift, maybe in our work place, maybe in our home,

maybe at Coffee and Chat, or Playgroup or Mainly Music or Craft or English class or Thrive or Men's Brekky... Thank you to those who were at Coffee and Chat and spoke to her. I am sure they received much more than they gave.

Wednesday with Playgroup, Thursday with Mainly Music, Friday with Coffee and Chat and Saturday with English classes are all growing under God's blessing.

Playgroup is now averaging 14 children, and each week we now have fun doing an activity. Mainly Music has 38 children, then add caregivers! (which makes for a crazily busy morning!) English class has over 10 people attending, and now Coffee and Chat, show that there is a community need and we pray that God will give us the ability to grow with these numbers, and to share His message. We send monthly Mainly Music and Playgroup Newsletter Emails to keep everyone up to date and to share the activities happening at the church.



We can give our friendship, but we can also let them know God's friendship and love for them.

I thank you for your prayers, and I pray that one day soon the young mum from Playgroup will feel comfortable enough to join us in worship one Sunday.

# Motors & Machines...

Each year we are given the privilege of helping our brothers and sisters in Ethiopia and South Sudan, in the areas of Malual and Nyinenyoup.

You may remember we have helped this area before with purchasing canoes and school desks... and Malual is the area that Stephen grew up in. This area is just inside South Sudan and Nyinenyoup is just over the border in Ethiopia.

These areas have been in the news recently, with the latest news that over 200 children have been kidnapped, their parents murdered by tribes from Southern Sudan. Cows were also taken. The villages targeted were not villages that we support, and we thank God that 2 weeks ago, 18 children were rescued. It just reminds us how tense the situation in Africa remains, and how little a life seems to matter there.

But there have been great stories coming from Malual as well. Did you know, that the church we gave the canoes to, not only use them as ambulances but they also hire the canoes to those transporting crops. In

2015 they have raised 5,000birr, A\$350... Which is a massive amount. One of their pastors, Pastor Peter Ter, died, and the church community bought his widow a cow (3,000birr) so she had an income, from that money raised...

So, once again, who would have thought, that your donation that bought a canoe, would end up helping this widow in Malual... Thank you! But how much better would it be if we could put a motor on one of the canoes?

It would save between 5 hours to 2 days when being used as an ambulance transporting to either Nyinenyoup or Gambella... how many lives could we save

...and just as those canoes are important – imagine how useful sewing machines could be?

They create a new industry for the church, just as that cow has created a new industry! But remember, we cannot simply buy a normal sewing machine, as these villages don't have electricity. The villages only have generators for an hour or so a day. So, we need to purchase "pedal sewing machines" and they cost around \$500 US dollars each...

But, the industry that would create would provide income to the church and the local village and would help them become self sufficient.

I know that we here at Glynde are busy ourselves with our church Redevelopment, and everyone is doing their best to make this happen... and I know you probably do not want to hear a request for more money... but I am here asking you to help us raise enough money to buy 2 – 3 sewing machines, and maybe even a motor for a canoe!

I know I struggle to understand how the people of Malual live – how they want to be able to look after their own community even though the wider area has suffered from such vicious attacks and kidnapping.... and yet how they are so proud to be our brothers and sisters.

We are asking that over the next couple of weeks you would prayerfully consider supporting this outreach mission.


We know the sewing machines will cost US \$500 each, and we are unsure how much we need for that motor, but whatever we can raise I am sure they can use to convert into a motor...

# A Reflection...

The farmyard was peaceful when Wilbur woke one morning. He looked around to see that he was all alone. *Where's my Mummy?* he asked. He trotted over to a horse and asked the same question, *Are you my Mummy?* No, said the horse, *I am too big and my tail is too long.* Wilbur tried again when he saw a dog. *Are you my Mummy?* *You are not too big and your tail is short. No, said the dog, my legs are too long and I can run very fast.* Wilbur continued asking other animals but he found that he was one lonely, single, little pig! What kind of family could we imagine for Wilbur?

Families come in different shapes and sizes, often comprised of several generations which share similar experiences, social gatherings, and sometimes grievances and tragedies. Each person, though, grows in unique and special ways because this is



how God planned it. In three generations we find three very exceptional and different people. Our education, both taught and experienced, can be radically opposed to each other. But, we live together each growing and sharing a unique bond because this is how God intended us to be, nurtured and safe. Do we pray together? Do we have one faith journey? Do we all lead loving and forgiving lives? You can answer those questions for yourselves.

## Faith Families. What are these?

According to Grow Ministries Faith 5, these are families who share, read, talk, pray and bless 'every night in every home.' They are also intergenerational. But, do we all live together 'at home'? What about those of us whose children and grandchildren live elsewhere? How can we be 'faith families'? Does this have to do with our Father God whose Son Jesus is our brother, and the Holy Spirit being our nurturer? Or does 'family' mean people of various ages and experiences gathering together sharing their faith journeys? I believe that it is both concepts. How can that work?

One common denominator for all would be food! We can share meals together, as a family. We can share experiences—good and not so good, as a family. We could share bible verses that are significant for us, as a family. If we feel comfortable, we could pray together and offer blessings, as a family.



Where do we fit in these family images? Do we experience conflict, are alone, or

perhaps totally involved and happy in our own surroundings? One would like to think that we, as God's children in this Church

Family, would readily want to join together to share, read, talk, pray and bless each other. What is it that prevents us from being willing to do this? Why do we not 'enjoy' the company of others in our church community? What needs to happen before we all are members (participants) in one 'family' group or another? Aah, I know. We are all individuals doing our best to follow God's plans for our lives. He made us uniquely



human and free to follow our own paths in life. We are very busy following along and doing what is best for us. Of course!

In I Corinthians 15 : 1-4, Paul says, "*And now I want to remind you, brothers, of the Good News which I preached to you, which you received, and on which your faith stands firm. **That is the gospel, the message that I preached to you. You are saved by the gospel if you hold firmly to it—unless it was for nothing that you believed.** I passed onto you what I received, which is of the greatest importance: **that Christ died for our sins, as written in the Scriptures; that he was buried, and was raised to life on the third day, as written in the Scriptures; that he appeared to Peter and then to all the twelve apostles.***"

The gospel of Jesus Christ's suffering, death

and resurrection is what ties us together as family. Christ died in our stead so that we may experience his forgiveness and eternal love for us to share with each other. Is there a better way than sharing this joy and celebrating God's love for us than in groups around his word?

I am scared to share in a group. I am sure to not be understood. My life has been so different from other people's. I have nothing to offer that others haven't already got. Why would anyone want me in their group? I am single—no partner to support me or with whom to debrief afterwards. Maybe, I just want to opt out and spend time with Jesus on my own! Before I came to worship at Glynde I was part of another Church Family. When I came I didn't want to push in when others were talking—no-one invited me to join them or ask me for a meal to get to know me. I was told 'to make an effort' to fit in. It was much safer to walk away and build a wall around myself so that I would not be hurt any more.

God loves me, and you; he died on the cross for me, and you; he rose from the grave for me, and you, so that we can live with him forever in heavenly bliss. Nothing else in this world, surely, is more important than that. He washes away our shame and guilt with his precious blood, and feeds us at his table. We are free to share. Let's do it.



# Lifelong Followers of Jesus

and to live out everything that their teacher asked. These are people who trust their teacher with everything, who believe that they have something to say about every aspect of life. Disciples are people who wholeheartedly live out the call of Jesus every day. We are called to go and make lifelong active followers of Jesus.

It seems to me that if our mission is clear, then we need to have a strategy in order to do this. In the Old Testament it is clear that both the Bayith and the Mishpachah has critical roles in the spiritual formation of people. The Bayith, or household in our understanding, was the primary place of faith formation for all ages. The Mishpachah, or community of households, was where the households were encouraged in their role in faith formation. In our western world, we've taken the view that the church is the primary place of faith formation. Scripture is clear – this role belongs to the household. What would it look like if we saw our role as encouraging the household?

Information alone does not make disciples. You've heard the old expression – head knowledge needs to become heart knowledge. That is information plus formation brings transformation.



“Listen, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength. And you must commit yourselves wholeheartedly to these commands that I am giving you today. Repeat them again and again to your children. Talk about them when you are at home and when you are on the road, when you are going to bed and when you are getting up. Tie them to your hands and wear them on your forehead as reminders. Write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates.”  
Deuteronomy 6:4-9

Jesus commissioned us to go and make disciples of all nations. The word disciple is derived from the Greek word **mathetes**, which literally means pupil of, or apprentice of. These were the final words of Jesus to the disciples. He chose them specifically. He didn't say go and make believers, or go and make regular worshippers, or go and make members. Jesus chose to specifically say go and make disciples – pupils or apprentices.

**Mathetes** refers to people who seek to understand everything about their teacher,

Here2Stay is a national movement across Australia encouraging the formation of lifelong active followers of Jesus. Searching through the Scriptures, ten key formational pillars of lifelong discipleship have been identified as needing to be built.

1. Anchors/Rites of Passage  
Anticipating, honouring and celebrating our 'transitions' and 'rites of passage'
2. Mentors and Life Coaches  
Take the time to listen, to be encouraging, to be available, to be accepting
3. Peak Experiences  
A place where God meets you, stretches and inspires you ... and transformation happens
4. Generational Connections  
Being intentional, relational and holistic in creating a culture of lifelong
5. formation across the ages
5. Positive Peer Communities  
We are not mean to travel alone in this life ... true friends are important
6. Respond with Compassion  
Model the compassion of Jesus in response to the needs of the world around us
7. Encounters with Jesus  
Be intentional about providing spaces to encounter Jesus
8. Big Story of the Bible  
Understanding the BIG STORY of the BIBLE is essential in faith formation
9. Serving in Mission  
Encourage the broad spectrum of ages to be involved in mission
10. Family/Household Nurture  
Families (households) are the primary faith communities for all ages


