Devotional thought

“He will go on before the Lord, in the spirit and power of Elijah ... to make ready a people prepared for the Lord.”

Luke 1:17

Is it time to panic? Gifts to buy, meals to prepare, concerts to hear, cards to send—can it all be wrapped up in the remaining days before Christmas?

John the Baptist can help. His message of repentance and seeking to live as God calls us to is as vital for us today as for his listeners two thousand years ago. John speaks out plainly and with urgency to get people ready for Jesus' coming.

When I listen to John speak, I see a man with practical answers for everyone: tax accountants, law enforcement officers, people who buy and sell in the marketplace, people who have more than they need. John tells them to do right: give away that extra food; be honest; don't take advantage of the weak or the poor; don't accuse people falsely; be content. John applies the command to “love your neighbour” in practical ways that are open to everyone. “And with many other words John exhorted the people and proclaimed the good news to them.”

Actually that's the theme that Alyssa has chosen for this edition of AT GLYNDE: "Getting ready". Getting ready for what in particular? Well, for Christmas, for a new year of serving the Lord together, for the end of COVID, hopefully, and ultimately for Jesus' return.

We are "getting ready" for Christmas, even now. The Worship Team have met and have planned **"Church 4 Kids" Christmas for Sunday, 29th November at the 10.30 a.m. service.** Come along as Adam Kremer leads us in looking forward to Christmas and the events of Christmas using THE BEGINNER'S BIBLE stories, having the children act out parts of the stories, and having Christmas songs to sing.

community.

I guess that we are all “getting ready”, too, for the end of COVID in our midst and in our world. Please continue praying for a vaccine, and that God will be with all the suffering in this world. Pray, also, that many will turn to Him for help and strength.

And finally, we are all ultimately “getting ready” for Jesus’ return at the Last Day. Thoughts about our own mortality and the shortness of our life have been increased somewhat by the events of COVID. How are we “ready” and “well prepared” for our own death, or the second coming of Jesus *if that comes sooner*? We are “well prepared” to face God when we follow Jesus, trusting in him as our Saviour. Remember what Paul writes in his letter to the church at Rome:

“For we conclude that a person is justified, *declared righteous*, only through faith in Jesus as our Saviour, and not by doing what the Law commands”
(Rom. 3:28).

As we trust in Jesus who suffered and died for the sins of everyone, we receive for ourselves personally the benefit of what Jesus, God’s Son, did for everyone on the cross. **We are “declared righteous”, put right with God, and nothing, not anything, not even death, can separate us from the love of God** (Rom. 8:38-39). **Now that’s being “well prepared” for whatever the future brings! J**

***May God bless you, and us as a community of faith here at Glynde, as we encourage one another and build one another up in our faith, and as we continue to reach out in any way that we can with the life transforming good news, *no the great news*, of God’s love, and His forgiveness through Jesus.**

Peripheral Vision...

People Get Ready

The first thing that crossed my mind when I knew that the theme of this edition of @Glynde was 'Get Ready' were the lyrics to the Curtis Mayfield song 'People Get Ready'. First released in the 1960s it has been recorded numerous times by different artists.

Here are the lyrics to either prompt your memory or to let you know what the song is about.

*People get ready
There's a train a comin'
You don't need no baggage
You just get on board
All you need is faith
To hear the diesels hummin'
You don't need no ticket
You just thank the Lord*

*So people get ready
There's a train to Jordan
Picking up passengers
Coast to coast
Faith is the key
Open the doors and board them*

*There's hope for all
Among those loved the most*

*There ain't no room
For the hopeless sinner
Who would hurt all mankind
Just to save his own
Have pity on those whose
Chances grow thinner
There's no hiding place
Against the Kingdom's throne*

*So people get ready
There's a train a comin'
You don't need no baggage
You just get on board
To hear the diesels hummin'
Don't need no ticket
You just thank the Lord*

Apparently, Mayfield wrote the song after being inspired by Martin Luther King Jr's march on Washington and his "I have a dream" speech. It is a wonderful song with a clear spirit and message of hope. When I listen to it, I can't help but feel uplifted. It appears to reflect the social mood of the time and place, where there was real

anticipation and hope that the US was on the way to becoming a country where all people would be treated with equal respect and dignity, and provided the same opportunities. Social commentator Juan Williams stated, "The train that is coming in the song speaks to a chance for redemption - the long-sought chance to rise above racism, to stand apart from despair and any desire for retaliation - an end to the cycle of pain." Music critic Stanley Crouch commented that "by saying, 'There's a train a-comin', get ready,' that was like saying, OK, so regardless of what happens, get yourself together for this because you are going to get a chance. Your chance is coming."

The song sends the message that the hope expressed will only be fully realised in eternity. This leads to the second theme of the song, which is faith. The instruction is not about buying your way to eternity with a 'ticket' or packing the right stuff, which we can interpret as doing the right thing. It is faith and trust in God that provides the certainty that one day your hope will be realised. John 3:16 says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life". So, what do we need to do to get ready? When we accept what God offers through Jesus we are ready, we are ready now!

So, what next? What do we do while we are ready and waiting? Looking at Matthew 24 and 25, which talks about the times to come and how to prepare, three things stand out: live in expectation; be faithful with what we have; and serve others.

When I think of expectation, I also think of anticipation, which conveys to me a sense of excitement. I know generally in life when I plan for things that I enjoy my outlook improves as I now have something to look forward to. The same applies when I plan for my life to be lived with God at the centre, it enables me to live life positively with a sense of anticipation regarding how he'll use me for his purposes.

Secondly, we are compelled to be faithful with what God has provided and entrusted to us. This is conveyed in the story of the 3 servants (Matt. 25)

Lastly, we are to serve others. Jesus clear message is that we are to treat everyone as though it were him (Matt. 25: 45) particularly those who are 'hungry or thirsty or homeless or shivering or sick or in prison'. Our faith is lived, manifested, through acts of service and kindness.

I like the way these ideas are expressed in Micah 6:8 (The Message).

*But he's already made it plain, how to live and what to do,
What God is looking for in men and women.
It's quite simple: Do what is fair and just to your neighbour,
Be compassionate and loyal in love...*

Getting back to Mayfield's song. Acknowledging that not all is right with this world, that while it continues to exist suffering, hurt, injustice and evil will also continue, he nevertheless points to the hope and ultimate solution found in the 'train a-comin', God's train. So, people @Glynde get ready!

From our Cross-Cultural Coordinator...

When I hear the words, Get ready, I think of school sport's day. On these occasions you hear the words, Get ready, on your marks, Get set, Go..... These words, get ready, are personal, charged with anticipation, swept by excitement and motivating.

In Matthew 25 v 1-13 we are met with the words of being "watchful and ready", in the parable of the ten young women. The footnote in the R.S.V. states: *The whole idea of the parable is that Christians should watch, be ready, be prepared for the coming of the Lord.* Indeed, as we move into Advent, we prepare our hearts to welcome Jesus who came over 2,000 years ago. In Adelaide entering this season of Advent, we are fortunate to see the Jacaranda trees burst into purple. This burst of purple reminds us too of the expectations of our future King.

Are we prepared? What does this mean?

These words, be prepared, get ready, surely calls at a very personal level. Get ready, is a call to the individual. The response for me is to reflect on my role in cross-cultural ministry.

There has been much that I have learnt in the last 6 months. Understanding my role and my place in this community has and does continue to grow. In this role, flexibility is vital. Programs designed are scaffolding but the community and the events which occur fill in the details. Relationships are so important for they are the bonds which keep us together as humans in our shared experiences. In these relationships where trust, respect, dialogue and kindness are found here we can experience God's grace and a glimpse of heaven on earth.

I have learnt to see Glynde Church as a place where God calls. He calls those inquiring about the Christian life. He called the Chinese Grace Community. He works in unexpected ways but asks us to seek and find; knock and the door will be open.....He has provided these beautiful facilities and a dedicated community committed to the vision of sharing Jesus.

He calls the volunteers. They have pride in belonging to this community. They have a sense of belonging not unlike aboriginal people. Aboriginal culture sees land as belonging to them; land is not something to be bought or sold but cherished. In the same sense, Glynde Church is not a place for commercial gain or a business, it is a place where love and care abound. As Craig Heidenreich said in, *The Lutheran* (July 2020), 'when we fish, it's a corporate effort'. Jesus walks with us in our hospitality, in our sharing, giving and loving.

I have learnt (and will continue to learn) that it is vital to be open to the needs within the mid-week community; to be prayerful and to be non-judgemental yet critical of my own flaws. In Grace over Lunch connecting with the Chinese community means using the language of food to share our experiences and see the grace of God poured out in hospitality. As Barbara Mattiske said at our staff meeting, 'We exist for friendship and love. Our hospitality is always focused to be relational '.

My aim is to live theology; to show pastoral care and to consciously be aware of outreach and Jesus' presence in my life.

May Jesus bless you all richly with His love and peace.

Day of Prayer and Praise

The world's in a mess

Is that what you think too, when you hear the news? Do you feel angry about those in some countries who persecute Christians, and even kill them? It's estimated that there are millions of persecuted worldwide. But attempts to wipe out Christianity have failed, as God continues to build His church. Some people are fearful. Some just badmouth people who do such evil things. These reactions are natural, but a better and more powerful way to respond is to turn to almighty God in prayer.



Why should prayer make any difference? God's word says in James 5:16b that He allows Himself to be moved by the prayers of His church: *The prayer of the righteous is powerful and effective*. So if people who know and love God pray to Him, better things can happen! We can't be in every troubled place in the world, but God is there!

All local initiatives or activities we're involved in also need the guidance of God's Holy Spirit for them to be the *best* they can be. How do we know that? A well-known verse in Psalm 127 says: *If the Lord does not build the house, the work of the builders is useless*. So that tells us that it's God's idea that we consult Him earnestly about everything. It's *not* such a good idea to try to do things 'in our own strength'. We know that He loves to listen to His children. This is nothing new – prayer is one of the absolute basics of the Christian faith.

Put this date in your diary: **Saturday 7 November**. A *Day of Prayer and Praise* is to be held, with opportunity to spend an hour in prayer in the quietness of our church building. You can come at a time that suits you, from 10 am onwards. Some suggestions will be provided, to get you started, or you can just 'do your own thing'. We can join with other Christians who have set aside an *International Day of Prayer* for the persecuted church, seeking God's blessing and transforming power. So the scope of our *Glynde Day of Prayer and Praise* is both local and worldwide.

To finish off this special day, you can come back to the church for a brief time of **worship at 6 pm**, followed by fellowship over a simple **meal at 6.30 pm**.

A man and his boat...

So no matter who, when or how, continue to help, sustain, listen attentively, wipe tears and carefully repair all the 'leaks' you find. We never know when someone is in need of us, or when God presents the opportunity for us to be helpful and important to someone.

Along the way, you may have repaired numerous 'boat holes' for several people without realising how many lives you have saved.

Treasurer's Report for the Year to 30 September 2020
