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**Anyone who is having troubles should pray. Anyone who is happy should sing praises (James 5:13).**

[Read James 5:13–18](#)

That's it, then. Pray – there is no situation where you can't. While 'having troubles' and being 'happy' don't cover every circumstance, in the context, they get pretty close.

Think about it for a moment. Which one would you say is easier: to pray when in trouble or to pray when happy? I imagine you could make a case for either.

In theory, when you are happy, the praises should flow automatically. But, of course, when we are doing well, whatever form that may take, it is often easier to forget about God or Jesus: to take the credit ourselves, enjoy the moment and live life to the full (our version of full anyway). So, the praises may go missing or stop altogether – until there is a reminder of the Good Giver.

In theory, when you are in trouble, prayer should be the first thing to happen. But again, we can look to other solutions, our own devices and the help of experts. God is forgotten. Until we decide to blame God for our situation! Or recognise that perhaps God may help – often through everyday people, events that we just haven't noticed, the anointing of oil or the prayers of mature Christians (verse 14).

So James reminds us to pray in every situation. Why? Because it brings us closer to God.

How better to appreciate what we are given: a beautiful sunset, a new child, a restored relationship, a house to live in, food on the table (at home or in a restaurant!), clothes on our back – how better to appreciate these gifts than to praise the Giver, the Creator of all, the one who provides every blessing. And when we sing praises, there is an added blessing: awareness of the Presence of Life.

What comfort there is in offering our troubled situation, whatever it is – job loss, relationship breakdown, study struggles, no home to go to, grief – then bringing it to the Lord in prayer. What a friend we have in Jesus, indeed! Pray and sing praises; live in God's presence.

***Thank you, Jesus, that you know our every need. Even when we forget you, you are there beside us, carrying us, rejoicing with us and drawing us closer to you. All praise to you. Amen.***

# From the editor...



One of the things that we both comment on after watching an episode is how it has given us extra insight into the Bible stories that we have both heard many times over. 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## From Pastor Wayne...

\*Hi! I'm just back from three weeks Rest and Recreation, *the LCA's term for Long Service Leave*. Jenine and I had a refreshing break, with a couple of trips away, and time spent relaxing in the garden and going on long walks.

Now I'm on my final stretch as a full-time Pastor...I'll be retiring on Christmas Day. That leaves me with some five months with you 😊

As I write this, I'm thinking about what my priorities will be for this home stretch of full-time ministry....  
\*The focus verse that Fleur has given us, for reflection on, in this @Glynde comes from John, chapter 4, *the account of Jesus and the Samaritan woman at the well* It is the account of how "one day, quite out of the blue, quite unexpectedly, this empty woman met Someone who in the space of a single conversation transformed her emptiness into a sparkling fountain of satisfaction and joy". Yes, that's what happens when a person meets Jesus, listens to Jesus, and follows him as Saviour and Lord: their whole life is changed and through Jesus they can worship God "in Spirit and truth" (John 4:24), *that is, by the power of the Holy Spirit in them, and in Jesus' name, the One who is "the way, the truth, and the life"*.

\*Now this has been my focus in my whole public ministry as a Pastor: to enable people to meet the One who can change their whole life, *namely Jesus*. And to encourage and equip the followers of Jesus, *that's you*, to have this same focus.

So, I guess that this will continue to be my twin priorities as I head to the finish line of my role with you as your Pastor 😊

\*The Worship Calendar in this @Glynde gives an outline of what Bible passages and topics we will be thinking about in worship during the next three months. I'll be preaching on the Old Testament for the first half of this period, *partly in response to the claim that I don't preach that much on the Old Testament...True, but in my defence, I have always wanted to focus mainly on Jesus, the One who we trust in, and follow as God's children*. I hope you enjoy our brief look at the Old Testament, and that God speaks to you through these messages.

In the second half of this Winter-Spring period, I'll be focusing on some of the Big Questions of Life, like "How can you believe in God?", "How can I be right with God?", and so on. I think that hearing answers to these questions can remind us of the solid foundation that we have for our faith in God, and in Jesus as our Saviour and Lord.

\*Let me finish off as I usually do, with a blessing: **May God bless you, and us as a community of faith here at Glynde, as we encourage one another and build one another up in our faith, and as we continue to reach out in any way that we can with the life transforming good news – no, the great news - of God's love, and His forgiveness through Jesus.**

## From our Chairperson...

### In the Spirit and in Truth

The theme for this edition comes from John 4: 23-24, where we find Jesus in conversation with a Samaritan woman at a well. She is there to get water; he speaks of living water that provides eternal life. She recognises he is a prophet of the Jews and tries to argue where worship should be. Jesus says it's not about where but about who is worshiped.

John 4:23 issues a warning that could fill us with great fear and trembling. But the good news is that God wants our worship; otherwise, why would he call us to worship? What's more, Christ qualifies us to worship him.

The call is to worship God "in the Spirit and in truth." The Spirit gives us faith in God (Ephesians 2:8-9), and Scripture gives us the truth about God (Hebrews 4:12-13) so that we can know the God we worship. "Spirit and truth worship," then, is genuine worship. Being spiritually disciplined enables us to worship by knowing who God is, as well as who and whose we are.

We can and should worship privately, but we need to worship with others as well. We worship not because of the great things he's done for us, but because God is great, glorious, good, gracious, and worthy of worship. Worshipping regularly with others orients the rest of our lives around God. Together believers make the gospel visible to the world and encourage each other that the risen Christ is real. Where will you worship this week—and whom will you worship?

#### **Executive & Ministry update**

##### Pastoral vacancy 2023:

Thanks to everyone who filled in the pre-call survey. The data will be very valuable as we go through the process of calling a new pastor and also to guide us with our strategic direction in the future. This was shared along with the NCLS data by Assistant Bishop Stephen Schultz at our pre-call meeting on the 19<sup>th</sup> of June. If you are interested in a copy of the data, please see me.

The executive has appointed a call committee that will continue the process. Initial steps will be to collate a call package, followed by starting to shortlist possible names. To assist with this, we will soon have a list of current pastors available to call, which congregation members will be able to access and have the opportunity to submit names from.

The call committee will then refine the shortlist with the help of individual pastor profiles and advice from the District Office. Contact will then be made with potential candidates about their availability and interviews held. Following that, the call committee will make a recommendation to the congregation in preparation for a call meeting.

#### Fostering Integration Grant application:

Sharyn Schubert has applied (titled 'Project Friendship') for this government grant which she has prepared with the help of Val Kupke, Colleen Bradtke, and John Seeliger. The project is to make improvements to the multicultural hub (outdoors lawn area and the Playroom). Improvements include landscaping, paving, new carpet, air conditioning unit, large TV and a new barbecue. The Koreans and the Board for Ministry have supported this proposal. The amount requested is \$33,315. We will find out if we have been successful with this around Oct-Nov.

#### Cross-Cultural Ministry Grant:

Recently it was very exciting to be notified that the LCA SA/NT District have approved funding for our Cross-Cultural Ministries for three years at \$15,000 per year with annual reviews. With our current grant expiring in March next year, this has given us the reassurance to continue with our ministries and to be able to support our staff. This is the answer to much prayer. Praise be to God! We thank Helene Schulz in particular for collating the application for the grant.

#### 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the current church building:

It was fantastic to see some old faces and a lot of reminiscing over coffees and lunch. We thank God for the building that we worship in and for those that have been a part of building it and the worship communities within it. It was great to see lovely messages from both the Korean and Chinese worship communities, and a few stories from past members. Thanks go to those who helped organise, in particular Lyall Kupke for sending out invites and for the short history spiel highlighted in the services. We look forward now to our special 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the congregation in 2025.

#### Lutheran Care:

As you may have heard or read, Lutheran Care had indicated to us recently that they will be vacating our upstairs area at some point. We have just been notified that this will be on 31<sup>st</sup> August. We are already in the process of investigating other options and possible tenants. Hopefully we won't have a vacancy for very long.

## From our Cross-Cultural Coordinators...



**Dear friends in Christ,**

Is worship tied to a location or a system of liturgy? Certainly, we experienced this when we consider our latest multicultural service on 3<sup>rd</sup> July, 2022. It was a wonderful God-centred, Jesus-focused and gospel-inspired liturgy within our Church building. We "worshipped God in spirit and truth" (John 4:24). Yet reading John's gospel we find that worshipping God is not confined to location or ritualised communal expressions. The amazing experience of being in worship, either as a personal or communal expression is about honouring God, having reflected on our understanding of God and our love of Him, with our whole being.

To honour God is to give Him praise and we do. *Praise the LORD, my soul, and forget not all his benefits* Psalm 103:2. We thank Him for the many new relationships made mid-week, through the activities being provided. We are grateful for the opportunity to apply for a Commonwealth Grant in Fostering Integration and the insight this process highlighted. We thank John Seeliger, Colleen Bradtke and Val Kupke for their support. The results of the grant project will be known in October. We also thank God for an

extension of the Cross-cultural grant with the District Church Council approving wage funding for three years at \$15,000 per year. We thank Helene Schulz for putting the grant together.

This winter edition calls us to reflect on the mid-week ministry here at Glynde. Rika brings in this reflection, a call to us all to see 'this' body of Christ, our combined communities, as a place needing healing and continued blessings from a compassionate and loving God.

Is your 2022 new year's resolution ticked off or still in your to-do list? Personally, I would like to thank Glynde community for your ongoing support, kind words and actions, and prayer since I have started working in May last year. Working as a cross-cultural coordinator taught me to be more and more reliant on God. As you can see, I am not physically, mentally, or spiritually a tough or resilient person. Probably I am the kind of a person who'd say, "Let's walk... no more running, I have had enough" in a full marathon, about 2 km away from the start line. However, today I am still here writing

this, which means you have been surrounding me all the time and kept me going with encouragement. I believe it is because you believe this is God's ministry, not Rika's.

During Term 2, as we have reported to you in the multicultural service and other times, we welcomed many new people to the activities of mid-week. Some are new to Australia (from Korea, India, Russia, Iran etc); some have just welcomed their new babies and discovering their new community. It is always a blessing to know people find church a safe place to go to. They find peace here and make connections with people without worrying about being judged. Some open themselves quickly and some take rather a long time. Interestingly, however, I find so many similarities among us. What delights them, what saddens them, what is in their mind right now. What we take for granted though is that God gave us the same book, the Bible which shows us our human nature. All races, all backgrounds, all genders, all the people with all sorts of issues, the same book, the Bible. Yet it touches each one of us so deeply because it is purely the truth, ultimate truth, nothing but truth. When we ask for His Spirit to guide us to hear His words, the Spirit enables us to change our thoughts, our actions, and our lives. In short, it can set us free. Then we have only one choice, bow down before the throne and worship Him with all we are. He is an amazing God.

In Term 3, I would like to see more changes in people's lives. It is challenging to talk about faith to somebody who already has a different belief or has no interest in God. Sharyn and I would love to have you visiting our mid-week activities even once in a Term and listen to our mid-week friends. I am sure God will refresh your heart and give passion to pray for their salvation, which is a foundation of ministry. May our Father's will be done in our church as in heaven.


